FILIPINO AMERICAN VETERANS WANT JUSTICE!

On the morning of November 11th, 2009, hundreds of people marched from the Historic Pilipino town to the Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) and protested for the soldiers that proudly served during World War II. The supporters consisted of college students and Fil-Am organizations from all over Southern

California. They gathered in front of the Federal building along with the families and widows of Filipino veterans with one goal in mind - to claim full benefits that the government promised to give to the brave Filipino soldiers who fought for U.S. during WWII.

For over 8 years, Justice for Filipino American Veterans

(JFAV) have hosted the annual rally. This year, however, turned out to be more serious. Only gaining a lump sum of \$15,000 for Filipino veterans this year, more than 46,000 living veterans in both the Philippines and United States have yet to receive their full benefits. \$15,000 for the US citizens and \$9,000 for non-US citizens is only a temporary relief.

Although less people rallied this year, voices were still heard throughout downtown Los Angeles. A traditional Jeepney led the rally protesters yelling "DVA Don't Delay!", along with various other chants. Oncoming cars honked and yelled to support the march while local news videotaped from the streets and a helicopter. Various Fil-

Am group leaders, college student leaders and soldiers, spoke for the families and widows of the veterans. The protracted fight for the veterans will go on. Families and supporters everywhere will keep on battling until the courageous veterans get what they fully deserve.

PILIPINO RECIPE: PORK LUMPIANG SHANGHAI

Tired of the usual American Style Turkey, stuffing and cranberry Thanksgiving? Why not put a Pilipino twist to your holiday dinner this year by adding Lumpia to the table? Think it's too complicated? Well, here's a simple recipe you can do that you can use to prove to your family that you're actually learning some Pilipino culture from the Pilipino club on campus that your parents are always hating on:)

You Need:

- 1 pound ground pork
- 1/3 cup chopped garlic
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup minced carrots
- 1/3 cup sliced water chestnuts
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 30 lumpia wrappers
- 2 cups vegetable oil for frying

Directions:

- * Make sure you separate the lumpia wrappers beforehand in order for you to wrap the lumpias faster. Also, once you're done with step one, don't be afraid to fry a small sample of the filling to find out if you need more flavor by adding garlic salt or pepper.
- 1. Mix ground pork, onions, carrots, garlic, water chestnuts, garlic salt and pepper in a large bowl (It's more fun when you use your hands to mix it:D)
- 2. Place two heaping tablespoons of the filling diagonally near one corner of each wrapper, leaving a 1 1/2 inch space at both ends. Fold the side along the length of the filling over the filling, tuck in both ends, and roll neatly. Keep the roll tight as you assemble. Moisten the other side of the wrapper with water to seal the edge.
- 3. Now that you've wrapped all the lumpias, place a wok or large skillet over medium heat with 2 cups of vegetable oil.
- 4. Once the oil is hot, slide in 4 or 5 lumpias into the oil and fry it for about 10 minutes or until all the sides of the lumpia is golden brown. Drain on paper towels. And that's it! Enjoy your masterpiece! :D
